# Part A: Pupil premium strategy plan

## Statement of intent

At the heart of everything we do at Sunnybrow, is the drive to ensure that **all** our children reach their full potential by being Empowered to Exceed. Sunnybrow children **will** be a powerful force to be reckoned with as they enter the adult world. They will have a strong moral compass and be able to think 'big' so that they can progress onto the next chapter of their lives with the knowledge, skills and experience to achieve their dreams.

We see the raising of attainment for disadvantaged children as part of our commitment to ensuring every child in our school family has the chance to shine. We strive to achieve excellence for all by:

- Promoting an ethos of excellence and achievement for **all** children. No child is stereotyped because of their background.
- Placing an emphasis on the unique child. We get to know all of our children and their families very well so we can break down barriers and tailor support specifically to each individual need.
- Providing a high quality education for **all** pupils in our school with good quality teaching and assessment being central to this aim. Our disadvantaged pupils will be appropriately challenged in their learning and they will be encouraged and supported to succeed.
- Providing high quality interventions and support where appropriate.
- Promoting and nurturing every child emotional wellbeing and mental health.

The covid pandemic and resulting partial school closures did result in a definite detrimental impact on our usual levels of attainment. There were varying levels of engagement among our families which caused some gaps developing in the attainment of pupils upon return to school which did not previously exist. Our Pupil Premium Strategy works to support wider recovery plans across the school so that the children who have been the most impacted by the pandemic, including disadvantaged pupils, can make progress and achieve well.

*In our school, we all recognise that raising attainment, including that of disadvantaged pupils, is the responsibility of us all.*

## Challenges

This details the key challenges to achievement that we have identified among our disadvantaged pupils.

Challenge number	Detail of challenge
1	Assessments and observations indicate that speech, language and communication skills are underdeveloped on entry in to EYFS. This is more prevalent in disadvantaged pupils than in non-disadvantaged pupils. <b>In 2024-2025 cohort, 100% of non-disadvantaged</b>

	pupils reached GLD in Communication and Language compared to 33% of disadvantaged pupils.
2	Assessments and observations show that a greater proportion of disadvantaged than non-disadvantaged pupils do not meet the expected standard in phonics at the end of Year 1.
3	Internal assessments show that attainment in reading, writing and maths are significantly lower than pre-pandemic levels of attainments. They also show that, in most year groups, the proportion of disadvantaged pupils reaching the expected standard is lower than that of non-disadvantaged pupils.
4	Children’s mental health and wellbeing continues to be a challenge and, with the ever-growing concerns in relation to the cost of living crisis for parents, this remains a priority.
5	2022 – 2023 Attendance data evaluation shows that the attendance rates for disadvantaged pupils is lower than that of non-disadvantaged pupils. Persistent absence rates for disadvantaged pupils are significantly higher than for non-disadvantaged pupils. 2024-2025 data shows that 72% of the children classed as persistently absent were disadvantaged pupils.
6	A lack of enrichment opportunities particularly affects disadvantaged pupils which impacts directly on their language development, social skills and overall attainment.

## Intended outcomes

This explains the outcomes we are aiming for **by the end of our current strategy plan**, and how we will measure whether they have been achieved.

Improved language and communication	Assessments and observations show that the language and communication skills of disadvantaged pupils improve significantly and the gap between disadvantaged pupils and non-disadvantaged pupils narrows. (100% of non-disadvantaged pupils reached GLD in Communication and Language compared to 33.3% of disadvantaged pupils.) Staff will be highly skilled in supporting pupil’s communication and language development. Children will make good progress from their starting points.
Improved phonics outcomes.	Phonics outcomes in 2025-2026 show that 90% of disadvantaged pupils pass the Year 1 phonics screening check. 2024-2025-80% of children achieved phonics pass mark, with 67% (2/3) disadvantaged children achieving this.
Improved outcomes in reading, writing and maths by the end of KS2.	KS2 SATs outcomes in 2025-2026 show that more than 80% of pupils reach the expected standard in reading, writing and maths.

	<p>2024-2025-50% of non-disadvantaged pupils reached the expected standard in RWM compared to 33% of disadvantaged pupils in SATs. 2 disadvantaged pupils did not sit the tests. However, Teacher assessment and internal tracking showed 78% of disadvantaged pupils were assessed as achieving the expected standard.</p>

# Part B: Review of outcomes in the previous academic year

## Pupil premium strategy outcomes

This details the impact that our pupil premium activity had on pupils in the 2023-2026 academic years.

Impact on pupils in 2024-2025

Improved language and communication

56% of the EYFS cohort achieved a GLD at the end of EYFS. Only 33% of disadvantaged pupils achieved GLD in Communication and Language. However, this is only based on 9 pupils. Some of the pupils have a range of complex needs. All of the children in the cohort made excellent progress from their starting points.

Improved phonics outcomes

80% of the Y1 cohort achieved the pass mark for the phonics check. 75% of disadvantaged pupils achieved the pass mark, but the data should be treated with caution as there are only 5 pupils in the year group.

Improved outcomes in Reading, Writing and Maths by the end of KS2

This year's data is based on a cohort of 14 children. 2 children did not sit the KS2 SATs, which equates to 14%. In Writing, 79% of the cohort reached age-related expectations in writing. This is an increase on last years result of 67%. This year, the threshold for achieving the expected standard for Maths was raised by 5 marks in comparison to last year and the Reading score was raised by 2 marks. 3 children missed out on achieving the expected standard on the Reading paper by 2 marks. 1 child missed out on reaching the expected standard in Maths by 1 mark. As a result of this, our RWM combined was only 30% this year.

Provision for SEMH difficulties embedded across school

School has clear provision mapped out for SEMH provision across school. Children receive timely intervention and support. During their inspection of the school on 11.03.25, Ofsted commented that 'Pupils thrive in this nurturing environment... The school prioritises the development of pupils' understanding of mental health and healthy relationships. As a result, pupils discuss these themes with confidence. They know it is important to show respect, treat others fairly and pay attention to their emotions.'

To achieve and sustain improved attendance for all pupils, particularly disadvantaged pupils

Attendance continues to be a challenge at Sunnybrow and there remains a gap in attendance rates between disadvantaged and non-disadvantaged pupils.

Improved enrichment opportunities will impact directly on the language, social skills and attainment of disadvantaged pupils.

In the schools recent Ofsted inspection, we achieved a good rating for Personal Development. The opportunities we provide to develop our pupil's civic responsibilities was highlighted,
